- WHEREAS, the Rosebud Sioux Tribe Is a federally recognized Indian Tribe organized pursuant to the Indian Reorganization Act of 1934 and all pertinent amendments thereof; and
- WHEREAS, the Rosebud Sioux Tribe is governed by a Tribal Council made up of elected representatives who act in accordance with the powers granted to it by its Constitution and By-Laws; and
- WHEREAS, the Rosebud Sioux Tribal Council is authorized to promulgate and enforce ordinances for the maintenance of law and order, and to safeguard the peace and morals, and general welfare of the Tribe, pursuant to the Rosebud Sioux Tribe Constitution and By-laws, Article I, Sections 1 (k), and (m); and
- WHEREAS, the Rosebud Sioux Tribe has established the Tribal Budget and Finance Committee pursuant to the RST Ordinance No. 80-07, to operate with input from the directors of tribal programs and Tribal Council members to develop and coordinate all aspects of tribal budget activities in accordance with the Rosebud Sioux Tribe's Constitution and By-Laws; and
- WHEREAS, the Rosebud Sioux Tribe has been awarded funds under the "Supporting Tribal Public Health Capacity in Coronavirus Preparedness and Response" from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), within the US Department of Health and Human Services, in the amount of \$414,549, with a possible increase in funds, to be determined, with a project period of one year; and
- WHEREAS, the Health Administration will administer the "Rural Tribal COVID-19 Response" funds with the intent of supporting aspects of the COVID-19 response; and
- WHEREAS, the RST Finance Department shall maintain fiduciary responsibility over all grant funds including federal financial reporting as required by the Department of Health and Human Services; and
- WHEREAS, the awarded budget will allow the RST Health Administration to purchase communication devices including very-high frequency radios, storage space, and personal protective equipment (PPE);

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Rosebud Sioux Tribal Council authorizes the acceptance of the HRSA Rural Tribal COVID-19 Response funds to be implemented by the RST Health Administration and approves of the approved and awarded budget in the amount of \$414,549 and any currently pending increases in in funds from the CDC; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Tribal Council hereby authorizes the Tribal Chairman or his official designee to sign all pertinent applications, contracts and documents thereof.

Title: Emergency COVID-19 Response for the Sicangu Oyate

Project Narrative

Background

The target population for service delivery under this grant is the Rosebud Sioux Tribe, or Sicangu Lakota Oyate. Our land encompasses 20 recognized Indian communities, home to 30,277 enrolled tribal members and spread across five counties in Southcentral South Dakota. Todd County, the reservation seat, has the 8th highest county diabetes mortality rate in the nation; heart disease is the most common cause of death in the county. Rates of diabetes are more than three times higher than the national average; smoking and obesity rates both exceed the national average. The elevated rates of medical comorbidities known to heighten risk of complications from COVID-19 place our community at elevated risk from the virus.

According to the most recent US Census data, half of our members who live in Todd County, the reservation seat, live in poverty. Many of our tribal members reside in multigenerational homes that increase the risk of spread between infected family members; nine percent of the population is comprised of individuals over age 60.

Our tribe maintains a robust spectrum of health programs that provide critical health services that align with Lakota values. Such services include the tribal ambulance service, the Community Health Representative program, Elderly Affairs and Elderly Nutrition/Elderly Caregivers program, Sicangu Oyate Ocipi homeless shelter, and many other key tribal resources. These programs are poised to continue providing invaluable services to the tribe throughout the COVID-19 pandemic using their existing organizational capacity while meeting key performance metrics.

Approach

i. Purpose

The <u>purpose</u> of the program proposed herein is to provide infrastructural support to tribal organizations to facilitate an effective and timely response to mitigate the spread and impact of COVID-19 in Rosebud. We will <u>address this</u> need by providing frontline tribal organizations with personal protective equipment, communications infrastructure for emergency response team members, and emergency medical space and storage to manage heightened medical needs during the pandemic.

ii. Outcomes

We will measure <u>outcomes</u> of the grant activity through both process measures (including testing rates) as well as outcome measures (including COVID-19 diagnoses, hospitalizations and

mortality; number of dwellings in self-isolation/quarantine). This program hopes to increase the amount of testing; decrease the amount of diagnoses, hospitalizations and deaths; and increase the ratio of # dwellings with quarantine versus hospitalizations.

iii. Strategies and Activities

We propose to improve the provisions of the tribe's emergency response team and tribal health programs. We request:

- Two-way very high frequency radios to allow emergency response staff and other tribal team members to communicate in real time as needs and situations arise related to COVID-19. The equipment will be compatible with the tribe's current system used by the law enforcement teams.
- A storage container for COVID-19 supplies
- PPE, specifically, KN-95 masks, for essential tribal employees to respond to COVID-19
 - Note, this purchase has already been made, see Budget Justification
- Two medical triage tents for community-based needs as they arise

These supplies are essential to the tribe's COVID-19 response. With them, the tribe will be better equipped to respond to the needs of pandemic as they arise and pursuing the outcomes described elsewhere in this application.

a. Collaborations

The tribe will continue to collaborate with

- The Great Plains Tribal Epidemiology Center (in contact with CDC)
- The South Dakota Department of Health (in contact with CDC)
- Where appropriate, including through this program, with the CDC
- The Indian Health Service
- Other local health systems
- Massachusetts General Hospital through a Memorandum of Understanding

b. Target Populations and Health Disparities

This grant will serve the 30,277 tribal citizens who reside on the Rosebud Indian Reservation. Based on current rates of comorbidities known to worsen outcomes among patients with COVID-19, we estimate that 14,000 of these citizens are considered at higher risk of COVID-19 complications due to medical comorbidities, and 2,725 of our citizens are at elevated risk due to age.

The risk of COVID-19 to our community compounds pre-existing health disparities and health systems inequities that affect our community. Rates of heart disease, diabetes, chronic lung disease, and liver disease are high.⁴ The smoking rate is twice the national median, at 39.1%.⁵

Rates of serious mental illness, substance use disorder, and suicide are also high, due to historical and intergenerational adverse childhood events and trauma. The life expectancy in Rosebud is 68.5 years, the third lowest in the United States.⁶

In addition to the estimated 30,277 tribal members living on the reservation, our counties each have at least 20% non-tribal members. Including these non-tribal members and individuals (tribal members and others) who live just off-reservation, we estimate that the activities listed in this grant will support an additional 10,000 individuals, for a total population served of 40,277.

Applicant Evaluation and Performance Measurement Plan

We will collect rates of testing, diagnoses, hospitalizations and deaths from the South Dakota Department of Health, which are publicly reported.

We will internally track the number of patients asked to self-quarantine.

Data will be collected and shared by us and our partner organizations listed in IIIa. All partner organizations will engage in this program's planning, as well as the COVID-19 response, which will be closely linked. Rates of testing, diagnoses, hospitalizations and deaths are reported by the South Dakota Department of Health and the tribe will track self-quarantine data weekly, at minimum. These data will be readily available for continuous program quality improvement. We will also collaborate in data collection and sharing with the Rosebud Service Unit of the Indian Health Service (which is part of our COVID-19 task force) and the Great Plains Tribal Epidemiology Center. Affiliates at Massachusetts General Hospital will serve in an advisory capacity to support continuous quality improvement through a Memorandum of Understanding with the tribe.

Organizational Capacity of Applicants to Implement the Approach

The tribe operates an Emergency Preparedness Team which is currently leading a COVID-19 preparedness and response taskforce. The tribe maintains a master Title I contract through Public Law 93-638 including several service lines, such as ambulance, community health workers, suicide prevention, drug/alcohol treatment, and diabetes prevention. The tribe has the capacity to administer the activities and line items described here. The tribe will continue to leverage its partnerships with the entities listed in iii.a to support the pandemic response.

- WHEREAS, the Rosebud Sioux Tribe Is a federally recognized Indian Tribe organized pursuant to the Indian Reorganization Act of 1934 and all pertinent amendments thereof; and
- WHEREAS, the Rosebud Sioux Tribe is governed by a Tribal Council made up of elected representatives who act in accordance with the powers granted to it by its Constitution and By-Laws; and
- WHEREAS, the Rosebud Sioux Tribal Council is authorized to promulgate and enforce ordinances for the maintenance of law and order, and to safeguard the peace and morals, and general welfare of the Tribe, pursuant to the Rosebud Sioux Tribe Constitution and By-laws, Article I, Sections 1 (k), and (m); and
- WHEREAS, the Rosebud Sioux Tribe has established the Tribal Budget and Finance Committee pursuant to the RST Ordinance No. 80-07, to operate with input from the directors of tribal programs and Tribal Council members to develop and coordinate all aspects of tribal budget activities in accordance with the Rosebud Sioux Tribe's Constitution and By-Laws; and
- WHEREAS, the Rosebud Sioux Tribe has been awarded funds under the "Supporting Tribal Public Health Capacity in Coronavirus Preparedness and Response" from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), within the US Department of Health and Human Services, in the amount of \$414,549, with a possible increase in funds, to be determined, with a project period of one year; and
- WHEREAS, the Health Administration will administer the "Rural Tribal COVID-19 Response" funds with the intent of supporting aspects of the COVID-19 response; and
- WHEREAS, the RST Finance Department shall maintain fiduciary responsibility over all grant funds including federal financial reporting as required by the Department of Health and Human Services; and
- WHEREAS, the awarded budget will allow the RST Health Administration to purchase communication devices including very-high frequency radios, storage space, and personal protective equipment (PPE);

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Rosebud Sioux Tribal Council authorizes the acceptance of the HRSA Rural Tribal COVID-19 Response funds to be implemented by the RST Health Administration and approves of the approved and awarded budget in the amount of \$414,549 and any currently pending increases in in funds from the CDC; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Tribal Council hereby authorizes the Tribal Chairman or his official designee to sign all pertinent applications, contracts and documents thereof.
